AGENDA HEADING:

Approval of the 2022 Continuum of Care (CoC) Grant Program competitive application, including noncompetitive award of Youth Homeless Demonstration Program renewal and replacement grants, to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

SYNOPSIS:

This action is for City Council to approve an application to HUD for the 2022 CoC Program, which provides funding for efforts by community partners to quickly re-house homeless persons, minimize trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness, to promote access to programs, and optimize self-sufficiency among those experiencing homelessness. The application and subrecipient ranking are as recommended by Homeward, formerly Polk County Continuum of Care, Board and its Grant Review Committee.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Amount: \$4,549,015

Funding Source: Program Year 2022 HUD CoC Competitive Grant Program

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

- Every year, HUD releases a notification of funding for the CoC Program. This year, the notice was issued on August 1, 2022. The application is due September 30, 2022.
- Homeward, formerly known as the Polk County CoC, in partnership with the City, facilitates a local competitive grant review process where service providers working with homeless or persons at risk of homelessness submit proposals for funding renewal or new programs. Most proposals are funding renewal requests of existing programs.
- As part of the competitive application process, CoC Programs have been asked to prioritize projects as the most effective programs, serving the most vulnerable population, utilizing a coordinated intake system, and practice housing first and cost-effectiveness.

- When prioritizing and ranking projects, there are two (2) tiers. Some providers may be at risk of losing funding if categorized into Tier 2. New projects are automatically categorized in Tier 2 below the renewal applications.
- The 2022 HUD CoC Program allows the City and Homeward to channel \$3,630,188 in federal funds to support eight (8) regular CoC projects. In addition, \$918,827 is available for six (6) CoC projects to address youth homelessness. Additional funds are also being requested for planning and administration for Homeward staff.
- The Homeward Board of Directors met on October 18, 2021, to approve a motion to adopt the 2021 application as recommended by the Homeward Grant Committee and forward it to the City Council for approval.
