The following are comments on projects where there are differences between the staff and NRB recommendations, or no funding is recommended.

Neighborhood Based Service Delivery - Neighborhood Inspection Division: Staff recommendation - \$1,000,000. The NRB recommendation for this project is \$1,000,000 along with the estimated \$40,000 of CDBG program income from

the vehicle impoundment component of the NBSD program. This would bring the total available for the program in 2007 to \$1,040,000.

- Office of Economic Development Neighborhood Commercial Revitalization Loan Program: Staff recommendation - \$100,000. The NRB recommends zero funding for this program. The proposal was submitted 5 weeks late and was not complete at the time of submittal. We do not think it is fair to consider it for funding when all the other requests were submitted on time. While the NRB would like to see neighborhood commercial revitalization, this proposal was not directed at eligible designated neighborhoods and the implementation plan was confusing.
- <u>ISED Micro-enterprise</u>: Staff recommendation \$-0-. The NRB recommends \$30,000 for this project. The micro-enterprise development services provided by ISED have assisted several new small businesses to start up and others to expand. They target minorities and low-income persons. They also coordinate with the City's Economic Development Department to help micro-enterprises develop business plans and obtain financing.
- Homeless Emergency Shelter Programs: The NRB agrees with the staff recommendations for most of these projects. However, we recommend \$27,000 for St. Joseph's Family Shelter instead of the \$26,000 recommended by staff; \$26,000 for the CFI Domestic Violence Center instead of the \$30,000 recommended by staff; \$20,000 for IHYC Reggie's Place instead of the staff recommendation of zero funding; and zero funding for Primary Health Care instead of the \$20,000 staff recommendation. PHC continues to submit late reimbursement requests, leading the NRB to question their management capacity and/or their need for the funding. For example, the agency recently submitted reimbursement requests totaling \$259,023 for three programs that were 6 months, 12 months and 15 months late.
- Homeless Transitional Housing Programs: The NRB agreed with the staff recommendations for all but one of these programs. The Board recommends \$24,000 for the IHYC - Transitional Living/Street Outreach program, instead of zero funding as recommended by staff.
- <u>CHDC SeniorWise Home Repair:</u> Staff recommended \$140,000 for this program and the NRB raised it to \$149,000. The agency assists over 1,200 elderly residents annually, to safely remain in their own homes.
- Des Moines Neighbors Resource Office: Staff recommended \$15,000 for this neighborhood capacity building program and the NRB agrees. The funds will be charged against the administration allocation, as required by HUD. The Board is excited about the potential of this program to assist neighborhood organizations through leadership training, newsletter development and printing, computer training, and coordination with city, county, school and state governments.

- Neighborhood Development Department Forest Ave. Redevelopment: Staff recommended \$150,000 and the NRB is recommending \$170,000 to speed up the acquisition of properties for this multi-year program.
- Neighborhood Conservation Services Housing Opportunities HOME: The NRB agrees with the staff recommendation of \$1,033,000 of HOME and ADDI funds. On November 21, 2005 the City Council authorized five-year contracts for HOME funds and directed the City Manager to develop new procedures for allocation of CDBG and HOME funding for housing projects. This was in response to audit findings regarding financial reconciliation and more timely expenditure of federal funds. The new procedures also facilitate coordinating projects with multiple funding sources that include the Polk County Housing Trust Fund, the Federal Home Loan Bank, and Low-Income Housing Tax Credits. This year NCS issued RFPs in early June and the NRB reviewed and recommended approval of the Department's allocations to non-profit and for profit housing agencies. The process also allowed the Board more time to review the programs and procedures. We believe this approach will result in timelier implementation and completion of rehabilitation and new construction of both rental and owner-occupied housing projects.
- Neighborhood Conservation Services Housing Opportunities CDBG: The NRB agrees with the staff recommendation of \$1,198,998 of CDBG funds. On July 24, 2006 the City Council approved the NRB's recommendation to allow a two-year contract period for this program. This will eliminate the need to "carryover" funds for previous program year contractual obligations and more accurately reflect and record what is being accomplished in each contract period. CDBG funds will be used for technical assistance, homeowner rehabilitation, minor home repairs, lead-based paint remediation, and acquisition rehab for sale to homeowners.
- Engineering Department Demolition: The NRB agrees with the staff recommendation for \$100,000 for this program. The Department requested \$146,000 but for the past few years there has been an average of \$50,000 of CDBG program income that can be used for this activity. Also, at the end of August the financial report shows that there was \$415,632.18 unspent. This amount, if carried over to 2007 and added to the recommended allocation and the program income would provide \$565,632.18 for this project. Also, it is our understanding that there is no City funds allocated for this activity and we recommend that the City leverage the considerable investment of CDBG funds if the 2007 funding is not sufficient.
- Neighborhood Finance Corporation Homebuyer Education: Staff recommended \$50,000 and the NRB recommends \$60,000. NFC reports that, while the number of clients are not increasing, the complexity of the issues preventing home ownership are, and require more staff time.
- <u>Creative Visions Project Turnaround:</u> Staff recommendation \$60,000. The NRB recommends \$50,000 and agrees with the staff recommendation that this allocation be contingent on the results of the August 2006 monitoring review.

In addition, the NRB is aware of the Des Moines Workforce Services Scan conducted by @Work Solutions, Inc. on behalf of the Des Moines Agenda One Economic Self-Sufficiency Cluster. The study, funded by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, reports that there is no systematic approach by providers to working with employers; no system of workforce partners; no incentive to coordinate and refer; an overall lack of performance measurement; and there is a gap in the provision of longer-term and more comprehensive services to job seekers who have significant barriers to stable employment. We recommend that the City support Agenda One's initiative to coordinate job training/job placement efforts between providers at the State, County, and local level and employers. Funding for these programs should be contingent on participation in a Workforce Continuum that includes all the stakeholders, addresses duplication of effort and reduces barriers to those most in need of stable employment.

• Public Works Department - SCRUB: staff recommendation - \$90,000. NRB recommendation - \$110,000. The NRB also recommends that the Public Works Department develop a pilot program that would reduce or eliminate the \$35.00 fee to low-income households for removal of large appliances. Because of the fee, these items are often dumped in vacant lots and end up costing more for removal than they would under the SCRUB program.

If there are additional 2007 CDBG, HOME, and/or ESG funds allocated by the federal government we recommend that only agencies who applied for the 2007 program year be considered for additional or reprogrammed funds. This insures that agencies do not by-pass the established citizen participation process and that their proposals have been reviewed.

We look forward to working with city staff, other public/private agencies, and the City Council to implement the 2007 Consolidated Plan.
