

MISSION

The Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation places inspiring art in increasing numbers of visible public spaces through public-private collaborations and partnerships. We educate and engage the community in an awareness and understanding of public art identity and culture.

VISION

The Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation is a catalyst for outstanding public art projects with the power to inspire people who reside, work, and visit Greater Des Moines and to shape a fair and just community. With our priorities, we seek to be a world-class destination for transformative public art.

ROLES and FUNCTION

We facilitate placement of site-specific art through public, private and community collaborations. We rely on our values to guide the use of a structured process. That process monitors site opportunities, identifies artists, carries out project review inquiries and juried artist selection processes. It also oversees concept development, installation, community engagement and long-term maintenance of its art installations.

CORE VALUES

Our values of Excellence, Inspiration, Integrity and Accessibility define our partnerships and collaborations. These provide the basis for criteria in selecting and prioritizing projects and acquisitions.

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A REWARDING Year of community Engagement

I am especially proud to present this Annual Report on behalf of the Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation Board of Directors. The Foundation made great strides last year with its aim to bring art to all points of the city. As you'll see throughout the report, our level of engagement with the community continues to increase as our reach across the city expands.

Our partnership with Oakridge Neighborhood continued with the completion of *King Yore II*, a vibrant mural filling an exterior wall on one of the Oakridge residences. This rounds out the *SWISH* initiative that began in 2019 with the brilliant artist Jordan Weber.

The Foundation supported the work of Jill Wells in her remarkable project on Juneteenth created for Artweek 2022. Wells and her team moved through the city during Artweek collecting thoughts from a wide variety of participants. You can read some of the entries on pages 18–19,

We are pleased to note that more will be coming from Wells next year as the Foundation committed to be a presenting sponsor of her *Freedom of Expression* project in spring 2023.

Moving from Des Moines' urban core to the travel hub of central Iowa, *Liftoff*, the seminal sculpture completed in December 2021, is now seen by thousands of travelers each day at the Des Moines International Airport's entrance and exit. We welcomed artist Alice Aycock back to Des Moines in September 2022 for the formal dedication of the sculpture which included performances by Ballet Des Moines dancers and local musicians B2wins. Aycock presented a fascinating lecture on her career the next day, which was free and open to the public.



The student's work was on view in a gallery on site for everyone to enjoy. As we headed further into autumn, we were graced with another artist visit, this time from Sheena Rose. The Barbadian artist's colorful bus shelter designs along the 6th Avenue Corridor were so well received, she was commissioned to create a DART bus wrap in 2022. These feats were celebrated with a street party complete with live music, local eats and children's activities, which the Foundation hosted with the 6th Avenue Corridor and DART. Rose also led a workshop with a creative group of elementary students from Children and Family Urban Movement (CFUM), based on Des Moines' north side, and gave a lively talk at DMACC's Urban Campus.

In addition to presenting these inspiring activities throughout the year, the Foundation completed the restoration and reinstallation of *Expansion* by Jun Kaneko on the Principal Riverwalk with an extraordinary team of experts hailing from Germany to Minneapolis.

The Foundation intends to capitalize on this momentum moving into 2023 with more plans for community engagement and new partnerships with local organizations. None of the great work above could be completed without the generous support of the City of Des Moines, BRAVO, and our many individual and corporate donors. Thank you also to my fellow board members for their dedication and participation during a particularly active year.

Powder coated aluminum and steel Height 21 feet, 3 inches x diameter 21 feet, 9 inches Commissioned in 2020 by Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation in honor of Johnny Danos; Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation, 2021.1 September 23, 2022 was an upLIFTing day, as Alice Aycock's *Liftoff* was formally dedicated at the Des Moines International Airport. A project that has been in the works since the early days of the pandemic, it was a joyous celebration of the air that lifts us off the ground, taking us to new places.

Joined by dancers from Ballet Des Moines, the dedication ceremony highlighted the massive accomplishments of the airport team and all those involved with the installation during negative temperatures. The ceremony also honored the late Johnny Danos, a prominent Des Moines community leader, and former president of the Community Foundation of Des Moines. Kevin Foley, Des Moines Airport Authority Executive Director, also shared his excitement and pride in the new piece, saying,

"This artwork will become synonymous with the Des Moines International Airport as it will be the first thing travelers see when entering the airport and the last thing when leaving. We are excited to have *Liftoff* installed here, proud to maintain it, and certainly join the Greater Des Moines Public Art Foundation in thanking all the generous donors who made this opportunity a reality."

Today, the sculpture stands 21 feet tall and continues to greet the nearly three million passengers that travel to and from the Des Moines International Airport each year.

COMPLETED PUBLIC ART PROJECT

In late October 2022, the Foundation welcomed Sheena Rose to Des Moines for a week of community engagement and celebration. Rose is the contemporary artist behind the bus shelter designs along the 6th Avenue Corridor. This project is the longest and most environmentally sustainable streetscape project ever undertaken by the City of Des Moines. Stretching 1.2 miles from the Des Moines River Bridge south to Interstate 235, the collection of designs from Rose creates a distinct visual identity for transit in the 6th Avenue Corridor district.

With seven bus shelters completed, it was time for a neighborhood street party! The event featured activities for children of all ages, live music from The Feel Right, free food from Joppa Experience and Tacos La Familia, a gallery of youth-created art and an open house for the recently rehabilitated 6AE Carriage House Office.

The party featured the unveiling of a DART bus wrapped with another design from Rose. During her time in Des Moines, Rose also hosted a workshop with area youth at Children and Family Urban Movement (CFUM)'s after-school program. The participants learned about the bus shelter project and later tried out their own ideas for mixed media collages. Wrapping up her time here, Rose presented an artist lecture at the Des Moines Area Community College (DMACC).


The Foundation is thrilled to have helped bring this project to life alongside DART and the 6th Avenue Corridor Urban Neighborhood Main Street Program.






SWISH 2 is the continuation of *SWISH*, a project initiated in 2019 by the Foundation that transforms basketball courts in ethnically diverse and low-income areas. The project involved two phases with a mural in each location: first on the basketball court at Oakridge Neighborhood in Des Moines, and second: a traditional mural on the side of Oakridge's Building 301.

Jordan Weber, a Des Moines native and artist-activist, was the lead artist and designer for both murals. He worked with Oakridge youth to develop the project theme that carries through both pieces honoring Yore Jieng, a 14-year-old Oakridge resident whose life was taken too soon. He loved basketball and spent many hours on the very same court. Five years after his death, in the fall of 2021, dozens of people gathered at the court to dedicate the newly completed *King Yore I* mural atop the court he used to play on so often. The image depicts Yore wearing a Laker's jersey and a tilted Nubian crown atop his head with flowers from South Sudan.

In 2002, Yore's family immigrated from Sudan. The piece draws on both Yore's Sudanese roots and his accomplishments here in Iowa. Weber explained further, "The idea was to put a crown on Yore's head slightly tilted because we know how hard it is to make it out of situations that we may be from." *King Yore II*, the second mural in the project, covers a wall at Oakridge facing Blank Children's Hospital. Painted by Jill Wells, the image depicts Yore yet again with a crown, but instead outlines his silhouette in native Sudanese flowers and butterflies, memorializing his life.

With both phases of the *SWISH* project completed, an event of celebration and remembrance is planned for January of 2023 at Oakridge. *King Yore I & II* remind us of what Yore enjoyed most in life and serves as a statement to the dreams and potential of all who will step onto the court.

JUNETEENTH IS HONORING THE HISTORY WE ALL NEED TO LEARN



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During Art Week Des Moines 2022, the Foundation celebrated Juneteenth alongside two artists from the Artist X Advocacy Mentorship program. Jill Wells and Jack Maren designed a gridstyle mural that traveled around the city and allowed individuals to participate by painting a piece of the grid. When finished, the Juneteenth Joy Community Grid Mural combined over 100 unique squares to form a multi-colored flower mural.

What is Juneteenth? A holiday celebrated on 19 June commemorating enslaved people's emancipation in the US. The holiday was first celebrated in Texas, where on that date in 1865, in the aftermath of the Civil War, slaves were declared free under the terms of the 1862 Emancipation Proclamation.

EXPANSION IS REPAIRED AND RETURNED TO THE COMMUNITY



This year we celebrate the return, repair and restoration of *Expansion* — a 15 x 21-foot hand blown glass mural created by Jun Kaneko of Omaha, Nebraska and originally brought to Des Moines in 2013.

In 2020, 10 pieces of the glass panels were damaged and the mural was removed from its home on the exterior wall of the downtown triangular pump station on the Principal Riverwalk. Working alongside Midwest Art Conservation Center, the Foundation was able to complete the repair and restoration of the piece in late 2022. The damaged panels had to be de-installed and replaced with new hand-blown pieces. Kaneko and Derix Glasstudios of Germany worked together to select the new pieces which would best recreate the mural's original aesthetic. Once completed, Architectural Wall Systems re-installed all 21 panels to their former brackets. The newlyrepaired piece was then caulked at the seams and surrounded by an aluminum frame. After a final cleaning, the mural's 39,000 LED lights were ready for illumination; bringing back its bright spectrum of vivid red, yellow, and blue to our downtown once again.



JORDAN WEBER. ARTIST. ACTIVIST. BELIEVER IN TRANSFORMATIVE COMMUNITY LANDSCAPES AND MUCH MUCH MORE.

Jordan J. Weber is a Des Moines-native and multi-disciplinary artist. He has been described as an environmental activist, regenerative land sculptor and a believer in transformative community landscapes. Making your way around Des Moines, you're likely to run into something he's had a hand in creating. From the DART bus passing you by, to the *United* basketball court and the recently completed *SWISH* court and mural in the Oakridge neighborhood, the mural and lending library with books from authors of color in the Franklin neighborhood, murals in the East Village to Cowles Commons to Ingersoll Avenue; Jordan's fingerprints are all across our city.

However, his talent and creative calls for social justice and environmental apartheid have caught the attention of cities and institutions across the entire country. Jordan has collaborated with organizations in industrially polluted neighborhoods in St. Louis, Minneapolis, Detroit, Red Hook, New York, and Boston. His works include temporary exhibits using repurposed materials as well as permanent structures built to fit the daily lives of individual communities. When asked to describe his work, Jordan stated,

"I produce sculptural objects to collectively transform community landscapes that face socioenvironmental racism against land and body." This commitment to activism goes beyond his personal aspirations and values, back to his parents. Jordan's father was a co-founder of the Fort Des Moines Black Soldiers Museum and his mother was the director of an inner-city youth center. Such influences have shaped his art into the transformative places and statements that we see today. His work has been exhibited across the country from New York, to Charlotte, Chicago, Omaha, Los Angeles and beyond. He has completed fellowships at A Blade of Grass NYC, the Tanne Foundation, and at Harvard's Graduate School of Design. He has been honored with the 2023 Guggenheim Award, the 2022 United States Artist Award, the 2020 Joan Mitchell Award, and the 2019 Creative Capital Award and in 2020 was artist-in-residence at the Walker Art Center.

However, Jordan remains committed to art that 'talks about and shows what we can do to honor individuals we've lost.' And his purpose is clear:

"My art is always geared towards environmental activism. That's the only reason I do it."

THE FOUNDATION SUPPORTS HARKIN FELLOW JILL WELLS AND FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION

In September 2022, Des Moines artist Jill Wells was named a fellow of The Harkin Institute for Public Policy & Citizen Engagement. Wells was the first artist to be chosen as a fellow in the organization's history. As a fellow, Wells will be conducting research and programming focused on accessibility in art. In December 2022, the Foundation Board of Directors voted to support Wells' work in this capacity as a presenting sponsor of *Freedom of Expression*, an exhibition planned for spring of 2023. *Freedom of Expression* will feature artwork by 13 artists who identify as living with a disability. The project will demonstrate elements of accessibility and privilege, while opening opportunities and creating professional support for local, emerging artists through mentorship and a culminating exhibition at the Polk County Heritage Gallery. Wells was raised in Indianola, Iowa, and is a 2005 graduate of Drake University with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree. She is well known for her dynamic and colorful narrative paintings investigating race, history, stereotypes, accessibility, and human experiences. Her pieces can be found at: xBk, Valley High School, The Havelocks in Dublin, The Center of Afro-futurist Studies at Public Space One, The City of Iowa City and The University of Iowa, Evelyn K. Davis Center for Working Families, Disability Rights Iowa, Iowa Lutheran Hospital, The Annette Nature Center, Blank Park Zoo, Polk County Jail (west wing) and Creative Visions Human Development Center, Currently Wells serves on the Board of Directors for The After School Arts Program, works as a full-time Artist in her private practice as well as running her mentorship program Artist X Advocacy, AXA.

In the periods between regular Board meetings, the Executive Committee conducts business, Actions taken by the Executive Committee are brought to the Board for ratification at its next business meeting.




